From the Interim Senior Pastor

"Happy Good Friday, Pastor!" Now, I don't know about you, but to me this sounds very strange. Let me tell you the story. When I was in seminary, I had the opportunity to work part-time in the library in town. Several Gettysburg college students worked there as well. One of them, named Meerdad, was from India. Meerdad was a Muslim, but was also very curious about the Christian faith, and was always asking me questions. In fact, even though I was still a student, he used to call me 'Pastor'.

One year on Good Friday, I was working in the morning-before they closed at noon. Meerdad was also assigned to work. So he came in that morning, and greeted me with, "Happy Good Friday, Pastor!" I must confess that I was a bit startled by his greeting. After all, most Christians would scarcely consider Good Friday a 'happy' day. We experience a lot of emotions on that day-sorrow for our sins, grief over the necessity of Jesus' suffering and death, regret over the things in our life that are often brought to the surface on such a day. But, 'happy'? Not really.

Over the years I have had plenty of opportunity to think on that experience. And I have concluded that maybe, just maybe, Meerdad was right. You might call it a mixed blessing-or a tragic necessity-or a bittersweet experience. But we do have reason to rejoice-because recalling Good Friday and our Savior's suffering and death gives it new meaning every year.

How many of us have had similar experiences in our lives? A loved one is sick for a long time, suffering greatly, then death claims them and brings release from pain forever-and we know the person is with God. A mixed blessing. Another person loses a job through layoff or cutback, and though it is an anxious time, God uses the occasion to lead the person into a new kind of work-one that is more rewarding. A bittersweet experience. Someone else is arrested for driving under the influence, and is put in jail. The experience becomes the occasion for the person to embrace sobriety and make a new start in life. A tragic necessity.

I know that many more similar examples are out there among you. We have seen God's hand at work over and over again, even in the midst of tragedy. I have been inspired by the work done on behalf of earthquake victims in Haiti, and by the work done locally by the organization known as THAW (The Heat And Warmth Fund). And in all these, I am reminded that the real Good Friday happened once, and NEVER needs to happen again-because the power of God's love is permanent, enduring, and saves us forever. The sacrifice of Jesus only needed to occur one time, and from that point until Jesus returns again, believers can rest in the love, grace and mercy paid for by his suffering. Wow-maybe Meerdad was right! Happy Good Friday!

South Lyon Power & Light News

Many of our Church seasons and holidays come from the medieval times. It was during the Great European Warming during the late Middle Ages, a period of climate change, that Lent as we know it was shaped.

The Great European Warming was seen as great news for European farmers, fishermen, merchants and clerics. Crops were bountiful, and in many places, two crops could be planted and harvested, since the ground thawed and the weather warmed earlier than it had, so February became a time to get ready for planting. As an aside, however, what was great for Europe and for Polynesian sailors (who settled Hawaii during this time) was bad news for large areas of the southwest of what would become America, southeast Asia, China and South America. This time period also saw the extinction of the Maya, Anasazi, and Ankor civilizations.

One of the key tasks of farming during this time was preparing the ashes. Ashes that had been saved from fires all winter were used to fertilize the fields, were made into pumice to sharpen tools, and into soap and cleanser for spring garments.

At the tail-end of winter, the world may seem dead, but it is the time to get ready; to see not the bare fields, but the abundance ready to fill the world; to gather the ashes of burnt-out things and turn them into newness, to gather the ashes of the dark winter of the soul and turn them into the colors of Spring.

Lent is a time to open the field of our hearts to the seed of growth, forgiveness, courage, patience, humor and charity, to take on the new tasks of sowing, digging and planting, not merely hunkering down and being passive. Let us do something glorious for the Lord of Spring and seed.

The next time you are in church prior to the service starting, take a look around you. Look at the person next to you. Don't talk to them, just look. Look at the person behind you, in front of you. Across the aisle from you. In fact try to look at everyone in the sanctuary.

By looking into each of these faces, can you tell what they are thinking or feeling. Can you tell if they are happy, lonely, or feel depressed? Are they unemployed, struggling with separation, divorce, or have a terminal illness? Do they feel embarrassed or think that others have a bigger, more important problem than they do? Maybe it's their kids, grandchildren, husband or parents. Maybe they just don't know what the problem is.

AND THAT IS THE POINT. We are all good at hiding our feelings. We walk around with smiles on our face and respond to the question "How are you" with an answer of "Fine". Do you know what Fine really means? Feelings I'm not expressing.

Thanks to a wonderful ministry you don't have to go at it alone. Stephen Ministry is a one to one confidential lay ministry.

It is a ministry that you can talk to another person and that person will not judge you, will not criticize you, a person who will not gossip about you.

Stephen Ministers are not counselors, but trained caregivers. Their role is to listen and to care--not to counsel or advise. They are trained to make professional referrals when caregiver needs go beyond the scope of their ministry.

Stephen ministry is a supervised ministry. Stephen Ministers meet twice monthly for peer supervision and continuing education.

It is confidential ministry. Even in supervision, the names of care receivers and specific details are never discussed.

Stephen Ministers do not make cold calls. They are assigned only to care receivers who agree to receive the care of a Stephen Minister.

If you are one of those people who answer "FINE" to all the questions asked Think again. We are here to help.

And if you are really fine, why not help someone else.

Become a Stephen Minister----classes are starting in January. Talk to one of our Stephen Leaders and then you can help all those FINE people.

This children's ministry is growing and for the remainder of this school year we will continue to serve fifty-nine families in our community. With four classrooms we have the ability to serve 64, so we are almost at capacity! This is an incredible blessing and watching the children grow and develop - and seeing their joy in learning about God's love for them is a wonderful gift that we have been given.

Open Enrollment is Expanding!

Little Saints is currently enrolling for Fall 2010. For preschool children must be three or four years of age by December 1st. Details about enrollment can be found on the website at www.littlesaintschristian.org. There are enrollment forms available to download. Interested families may also stop by, any day except Wednesdays, after 9:30 and prior to 12, noon. Please bring your children with you so that they have an opportunity to experience our classrooms while you ask valuable questions.

For this fall Little Saints is adding a PreK option. This program is designed similar to a Young Five's program. The curriculum is a bit more academic based than preschool (which is very play based). Mrs. Manross (current Purple Room teacher) will be teaching this ten student classroom and it will run on Monday, Wednesday, and Fridays from 9:00-3:00 each day. PreK is an excellent way to provide a full day environment, yet not as long as a full day Kindergarten, and prepare a child for a successful Kindergarten experience the year after.

Kids Against Hunger

Sign-up Soon! If you haven't already heard about this program, you will soon. Little Saints and All Saints are working together to raise enough funds to purchase food ingredients that will allow us to create 10,000 meals for children locally and around the country, and world, who need a good healthy meal. On May 8, 2010, we will need 120 volunteers to work together for about one hour to assemble and create 10,000 meals for children. The great thing about this program is that 1/3 of the meals will remain here and we will decide where they are most needed, 1/3 will go to national reserves for disaster relief, and 1/3 will go overseas to a country we designate. To do this we need two phases of help.

First, we need to generate \$2,800 to purchase the ingredients (yes, that is 28 cents per meal!). Little Saints chapel money for two months, Lenten offerings from All Saints, two weeks of "noisy offerings", and a bag-some-meals fundraising will generate those funds. We have currently applied to receive matching funds from Thrivent Financial for Lutherans to help us meet our goal of \$2,800. Please consider how many meals you can help to provide.

Second, watch for sign-ups to volunteer on May 8th. Children as young as four and adults up to ninety-nine can work together on this very uplifting event. It is a short time commitment on a Saturday morning - and promises to be a fun-filled experience.
